BS 213 Old Testament: Prophets (4)

BI 213 OT Prophets: Interpretation (1)

The OT Prophets are often seen as foretelling what was going to happen in the future. People turn to the prophets to see how Christ fulfills what was foretold and what is still future. But the prophets were primarily preachers declaring messages from God, calling people to covenant obedience. They spoke and wrote to an audience with similarities to us today.

If we focus on the foretelling, we will likely miss their message. We need to learn how to understand what the prophets were saying to their audience, then how their message applies to us today.

Course Description: Students will learn how to study and interpret the prophetic literature of the Old Testament, then put in practice what they learn to the study of the books of Isaiah to Malachi, considering their historical and cultural setting, literary structure, authorship, purpose, themes, theology and message.

CURRICULUM

Biblical Understanding: knowledge of the Word of God and the ability to interpret and apply it for a lifetime of study.

Spiritual Formation: being transformed into the image of Christ.

Ministry Development: understanding principles and developing skills for effective ministry.

NON-TRADITIONAL

Shepherds provides classroom learning experiences where teachers are mentors to the students. But the class time is greatly reduced to allow time for mentoring and learning in the church. Class time is scheduled in blocks so students will come to the school less often.

COSTS

Tuition, per credit	\$100.00
Audit tuition, per credit	\$40.00
Admissions Application Fee*	\$25.00

* Students may register for classes prior to applying for admissions. A limited number of credits may be earned before application to a program is required.

DEFERRED PAYMENT PLAN

When it is not possible to pay tuition in full, a student may arrange for deferred payments. There is a \$25 charge for this plan. It requires paying 1/3 of the tuition at the beginning, then two equal installments during the quarter (usually the first of each month).

FINANCIAL AID

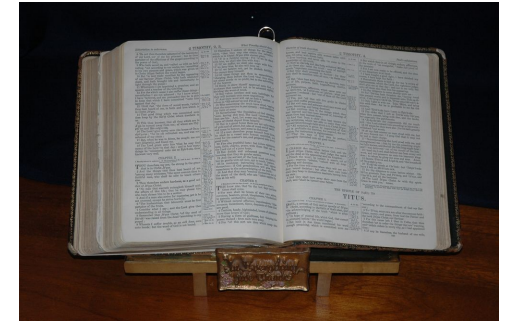
The college currently has no funds available for financial aid, but we have a few ways to possibly help needy students reduce their tuition.
